


Zoomin' Live in Unprecedented Times

For the continued health and safety of our members and our communities during the COVID-19 coronavirus global health pandemic, the 31st Biennial Convention of the Wisconsin AFL-CIO was held virtually via Zoom webinar livestream. The convention was streamed live from the union-built Fiserv Forum on Wednesday, September 30, 2020, beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Credentialed delegates received an invitation email with unique login to attend the convention safely from home. Delegates heard from invited guests who joined the convention by recorded video, live video stream, and in-person attendance. 

Politicians and Corporate Bosses Should Have Listened to Labor

President Bloomingdale delivered a moving and memorable speech highlighting the heroic work of Wisconsin workers. Bloomingdale urged leaders to prioritize an American-made supply chain for PPE and covid testing supplies and follow the lead of working people serving our communities.

Excerpts from President Bloomingdale's 31st Convention address:

"The original outbreak of the coronavirus was an act of nature largely beyond our control. Much of the damage it caused, however, was the result of deliberate deception coupled with an economic system that for too long has placed profits ahead of people. The impacts of the pandemic on millions of Americans would have been far less severe if politicians & corporate bosses would have listened to what we in labor have been saying for years.

Take just one example: PPE. For essential workers expected to stay on the job when the pandemic hit, the shortage of personal protective equipment forced them to make the terrible choice between their safety and a paycheck.

Twenty years ago, the vast majority of the PPE used by American workers was made right here in the USA, and as a result, workers had

the equipment they needed. Now, in 2020, nearly all of that critical production has been off-shored to China.

The lesson is clear—if we want a resilient economy capable of responding when a crisis hits, we need to be able to buy American, and to do that, we need to support our workers who make American. Exporting jobs means importing trouble. Simple as that. We told you so.

Brothers and sisters, in these unprecedented times, we will not work out our salvation in a selfish way, but by being the heroes those who went before us call on us to be. We will do the work history has put before us, to build the power of our fellow workers, to ensure the voice of the people is not silenced, to see our communities through these hard times and build back better. Brothers and sisters, together we will do these things; together we will set Wisconsin and our nation back on course; together we will be heroes."

Why Fiserv Forum? Union Built and Run

The Fiserv Forum was built by union members and it is union members who make the Forum's live events happen!

Completed in 2018 after just over two years of construction, it was union men and women of the Wisconsin Building Trades whose skills and dedication took the site from rubble to wow. A Project Labor Agreement was used to ensure good wages for local workers, project safety, and to develop a career pipeline for skilled workers.

Union members of IATSE Local 18, SEIU Local 1, and the Milwaukee Area Service and Hospitality Organization make the venue a success and ensure every event runs smoothly.

Secretary-Treasurer Delie:

Time to Tell Donald Trump His Time Is Up

Secretary-Treasurer Dennis Delie addressed delegates live from the Fiserv Forum, highlighting the long-term impact of former Governor Scott Walker's mishandling of Wisconsin's unemployment system. The Walker Administration enacted staff and funding cuts and put off modernization and technological upgrades that left the system unprepared to handle the sudden influx of thousands of workers during the pandemic.

Delie highlighted Donald Trump's callousness towards working people and his failed response to the COVID-19 pandemic. "He started out by lying to the American public about the threat. Then, he refused to acknowledge the severity of the pandemic. His delayed response and lack of preparedness undoubtedly contributed to the spread of the virus and the astounding loss of life that has now exceeded over 200,000 lives and the loss of millions of jobs," said Delie.

Delie highlighted that Trump's tax bill did nothing to help workers, it just lined the pockets of shareholders and helped companies ship jobs overseas. He also called out President Trump for paying just \$750 in federal taxes as well as spreading lies about election fraud to divide our nation with propaganda. "We can't lose sight of Trump's ongoing assault on unions and the laws and agencies designed to enforce worker rights," explained Delie. Under Trump, OSHA has been underfunded and understaffed with fewer inspectors than ever before. Trump has weakened the Department of Labor and appointed an antilabor attorney as its Secretary. He has left NLRB board seats vacant and implemented anti-union rule changes; rolled back worker safety standards and Obama-era overtime protections; and watered-down apprenticeship standards. It is time to vote Donald Trump out of office."

AFL-CIO's Trumka:

America is Seeing Union Members in New Light

AFL-CIO President Richard Trumka joined the Convention via Zoom, praising the work of union members on the ground in Wisconsin. He highlighted the labor movement's ability to come together to support each other and help our communities in times of crisis.

"Even with all of the uncertainty and pain, something good is happening in America," said AFL-CIO President Trumka. "Working people are showing up and fighting as one united labor movement. You've created the Union Mask Brigade, sewing and distributing personal protective equipment to essential workers. You've shown up for families who are struggling right now with your Be a Hero food drives. And you've sent Senator Ron Johnson a loud and clear message: pass the HEROES Act now! Union members have answered the call of COVID-19. Every day and in every way. We've served. We've sacrificed. We've healed. We've done it all."

Citing Joe Biden's plans to boost union rights and our economy by passing the PRO Act and making key investments in manufacturing and infrastructure, President Trumka called on union members in Wisconsin to do all we can to elect Joe Biden.

"To defeat the coronavirus, economic inequality and systemic racism, we're going to have to remove this dangerous president from the White House. This November, we need to elect Joe Biden. We know Joe and Joe knows us. He has been to our union halls. He has marched on our picket lines. That's Joe. Joe Biden wants a future that is "Made in All of America" by all of America's working people. That will create more good, union jobs. And Joe Biden supports the PRO Act so we can form a union freely and fairly and ban right to work once and for all. Wisconsin, the labor movement is strong. We're united. And when we show up, we get the job done!"





Congressman Mark Pocan: "As a 30-year member of IUPAT, my labor colleagues and I, we really are trying to make sure that the voices of workers are fully integrated into all that we do at the Capitol. 

Julie Greene Collier, Mobilization Director for the AFL-CIO: "We've had to adapt, adjust, and revamp what our programs look like in order to keep our brothers and sisters safe, but our goals remain the same. To win for workers up and down the ballot."



Sheila Cochran, Interim President of WRTP-BIG STEP: "We have the heart and soul of the labor movement at our hands every day. We are reaching people in non-traditional roles who want to be in manufacturing, who want to be construction and we work very hard to make sure they have all the skills they need to be great workers on the worksite. We don't care where you come from, we care that we help you get a better job and better circumstances."



Representative Gordon Hintz: "This session we saw Republicans were more interested in making Governor Evers a failure, in suffocating the process, in meeting the fewest days ever, passing the fewest bills ever. It's a cynical style of governing that you can only get away with if you've drawn maps that ensure you're re-elected every cycle. Thankfully, Gov. Evers has made decision that while hard, looked out for the public interest."



Laura Dresser, Associate Director of COWS:

"There's three emerging groups in the new covid economy.

The unemployed; those who risk virus exposure at work; and those who can work from home and not be exposed to virus via workplace interactions. For workers who risk exposure through costumer or client interactions, a voice on job, the ability to speak up for and get access to needed equipment and protective safety equipment as well as public policies that support those efforts will make an enormous difference going forward."

Federal Labor Law Fails Workers

Economist and University of Oregon Professor Gordon Lafer took a deep-dive into the anti-union industry where companies spend big bucks to skit or break federal labor law during NLRB elections. Lafer finds that anti-union scare tactics are intense, overwhelming and omnipresence as workers organize and that companies frequently break the law to avoid a union contact "as a matter of course because penalties are so weak in federal labor law."

The right to organize is about solving the crisis of inequality and letting people support their families. We must fix labor law to fix our broken economy. A union contact is the best path to a more just, equal, and fair society for all.

Governor Evers:

Legislators Need to Hold Up Their End of the Deal

Noting the inaction of the Wisconsin Legislature, which hasn't passed legislation since April 2020, Gov. Evers urged politicians to put people above politics.

"We have much work to do to ensure not just our workplaces, but our communities are safe, equitable and support the workers who keep the state afloat," Gov. Evers told delegates. "Wisconsin workers over the past seven months have risen to the challenges facing us, risking their own health and safety, and the health and safety of their families, to keep our communities and economy running. The pandemic further highlighted the importance of the work you do and the value of unions that represent working folks all across the state."

Evers provided an overview of the many ways in which we can support working people through the pandemic citing strong unions, prevailing wage laws, and getting additional funding through the CARES Act into local communities across the state.
